

FROM CANON MARK GILBERT

Dear Friends

As we approach the month of June, we are reminded of the significant event of Ascension Day, commemorated in the Parish Church of St Mary the Virgin, Petworth. Through the beautiful stained glass window depicting 'The Ascension of Our Lord.' This timeless event, captured in both scripture and art, holds profound significance for Christians worldwide.

The Ascension marks the final earthly appearance of Jesus Christ following his resurrection. As described in the Gospels, after spending forty days with his disciples post-resurrection, Jesus ascended into heaven, fulfilling the promise of his return to the Father. This event is not merely a conclusion to Christ's earthly ministry but signifies the beginning of a new phase in the divine plan of salvation.

The imagery of Christ ascending into heaven carries several layers of symbolism and theological importance. Firstly, it underscores the divinity of Christ. His ascension affirms his authority over all creation and his exaltation to the right hand of God. This elevation emphasizes his role as the divine mediator between God and humanity.

As we contemplate the significance of Ascension Day, let us be reminded of our call to bear witness to the risen and ascended Christ. Just as the disciples were commissioned to proclaim the good news to the ends of the earth, we are called to share the hope and joy found in Christ's victory over sin and death.

May the imagery of the Ascension depicted in our stained glass window serve as a constant reminder of Christ's promise of eternal presence and his invitation to join him in the heavenly banquet prepared for all believers.

PARISH CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGN, PETWORTH

Minutes of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) held on Wednesday 13th March

Opening Prayers

Father Mark welcomed Alexandra Soskin, Richard Hodgson and Andrew Harris (Architect) who gave the PCC a presentation on the proposed reinstatement of the Spire on St Mary the Virgin's tower.

He continued by saying that the church needed to be in a good financial situation to be able to look at a project such as the Spire. He also stated that there would be no decision tonight.

Mrs Soskin opened by saying that they were passionate about restoring the church to its former glory.

There would be absolutely no cost to the church, either now or for its maintenance in the future.

Why the interest? it would be a heritage project, a symbol of interest to the community and beyond, and to restore it to its former glory. The group feel that it would be a boost for St Mary's, and visitors, and a symbol of optimism. They would raise monies for the spire, and to help with the deficit which would take some of the financial burden from the PCC. There would be community benefit, by using local materials, and involving many local craftsmen in the project.

Funding has been gained for Spires elsewhere, giving some confidence that the project is feasible. They have spoken to a professional fund raiser, who is confident of raising money for this project.

Are we willing to allow the group to go out to the town to see if they would like a spire?

Concerns were expressed about spending so much money on a spire in the present financial climate. Mrs Soskin said that just the actual building of the spire could bring in many people, and schools, colleges etc.

The group feel that it would be inspirational beacon, drawing attention to the church. But change is always difficult, few people now can remember the church with a spire.

Would the church need to be closed during the building? Andrew Harris did not think it would be necessary. They would therefore be grateful for a decision in the reasonably near future.

Richard Hodgson and Andrew Harris spoke about the historical side of St Mary's, and the design, and how the spire might be built.

Father Mark thanked them for coming and their most informative talk. He again reiterated the need to be on a better footing as a church.

It was agreed that we will call a PCC meeting after Easter to discuss the Spire.

The minutes of the PCC Meeting held on 24th January were approved.

An update on St Marys' finances: Eileen Lintill (EL) circulated papers and explained their contents. There was £17,333.06 in the CAF account as of today, and £30,023.35 the Santander reserve. EL had gained more understanding and is intending to do more, although she pointed out that she isn't actually the treasurer. EL requires a formal minute to apply to M&G to have the name changed on all charities from Adrian Easton to Eileen Lintill. Proposed by Jill Easton, seconded by Alan Sutton. EL recommends looking at how the charity money is used in the future.

It was pointed out by Andrew Howard that, the only reason that we are in the black, is because we are not paying our full Quota to the Diocese.

EL reported that there had been a significant leak in the Flower Vestry. Mark Temple found a split in the leading, and the down pipe outside was blocked. This has been addressed. Mark is also going to check the rest of the guttering. The boiler hatch is to be replaced, as it has been found to be unsafe. The Quinquennial will take place during the Summer.

The PCC were unanimous in requesting that Andrew Brooke should lead a sub group to look at fund raising for the repair the bell, and its frame. Andrew would be asked to report back to the PCC when appropriate. Proposed by Andrew Howard, seconded by Jill Easton.

To receive updates on;

Safeguarding: Father Mark, Di Parr and Emma Parr need to be certificated. New rules have been sent from the Diocese about those who must be trained. On line safeguarding training will need to be done by all the PCC members. Father Mark would also speak to the Bishop about the new rulings.

Pastoral Care: Eileen updated, with a cause for concern of one couple in our congregation.

PACT: Arrangements for Palm Sunday are in hand, there will be donkeys in the procession this year. The spring lecture will take place on 26th April.

Deanery Synod: There had been no recent meeting.

Family Support Work: The drop-in at Sylvia Beaufoy continues to be well supported. FSW are actively fund raising.

St Mary's Music: There was no update.

Derek Rudge (DR) had found a suitable Notice Board for the porch, it is 4ft x 3ft and is blue with an aluminium surround. It was agreed that this should go ahead.

DR also questioned whether we should return to having a sidespersons' rota. DR also said that he was happy to continue as sidesperson.

PETWORTH PRIMARY SCHOOL



You could set your calendar by it. Around the first day of May, our ancestors would step outside to find foamy white clouds erupting across the Sussex countryside; the Hawthorn was blooming, spring was turning to summer. The sight was so visually stunning and so linked with the arrival of May that Hawthorn became the only British plant to be named after the month in which it blooms. Well, the name Hawthorn is derived from the Anglo-Saxon *hagathorn* (*haga* meaning hedge). I'm referring to that other name for Hawthorn: May.

Unlike the impetuous Blackthorn, which flowers in March before it's even bothered to grow leaves, the Hawthorn is more dignified. It waits until it has clothed itself in undergarments of lobed leaves before it dons a resplendent gown of exquisite white flowers. This stunning costume and perfect timing meant Hawthorn took centre stage at May Day celebrations and it partied with Green Men, Morris Dancers, Maypoles and May Queens. 'Gathering nuts in May' actually refers to 'gathering knots of May' to make May Day garlands and decorations.



Then, in the middle of the eighteenth century, tragedy struck. I don't know about you, but I get thrown into disarray twice a year when the clocks change. My life would have gone into meltdown in 1752 as our whole calendar changed from Julian to Gregorian, and we lost an entire 11 days. In this new timeline, Hawthorn now found itself late for the party, blooming around May 12th.

It wasn't the first time Hawthorn had been cast aside. Superstitions dictated that bringing Hawthorn indoors led to misfortune - even death. This could stem from the fact that Hawthorn blooms release trimethylamine, which gives the flowers that unpleasant smell of cat's wee and attracts pollinating insects. It's also a chemical formed in decaying tissue and reminded people of the smell of Black Death - and nobody wanted to be reminded of that.

But the world has changed since I was a nipper - we're warming up. For a temperature-sensitive plant like Hawthorn, the blooming times are changing again. Hawthorn is responding to climate change by flowering up to two weeks earlier than it was thirty years ago. It has crept back to bloom around May Day and is now more commonly seen flowering at the end of April. So, this May Day, cast your clouts, get out into the great outdoors, and welcome the return of the real May Queen.



I remember at primary school being taught 'Ne're cast a clout 'til May is out'. I translated this gibberish into the fact that you should keep your warm clothes on until the end of May. I've only just discovered that 'May is out' refers to Hawthorn blooming. My clouts could have been cast weeks earlier.

MIDHURST ROTHER COLLEGE

Ensuring the Holocaust is Remembered

In their Religion and Philosophy lessons, Year 9 students at Midhurst Rother College have been gaining insight into the Holocaust. In this module of study, students learn about how the Jews were persecuted and murdered in Germany during WW2. They become more informed about Kristallnacht (the Night of the Broken Glass), the Einsatzgruppen (SS killing squad) and the concentration camps. They also learn that almost no one spoke out to help the Jews and that many Jews and others did not know what happened at the camps. They take away a clear understanding of why it is so important that something as atrocious as this ever happens again.

They have been working on Holocaust memorials to help ensure the Holocaust is remembered by future generations. Students were tasked with creating something that commemorated the lives of those lost, while being engaging and full of symbolism. After spending a lesson looking at memorials around the world, students began to plan projects they could create at home over the Easter Holidays. These memorials had to be accompanied with a written explanation of the symbolism behind their creation, along with an explanation about why memorials of this nature are so important at ensuring we learn from this history. Memorials ranged from small garden models, art instillations, paintings, drawings, sculptures along with written tributes including poems and case studies on survivors. Students have tackled this subject with maturity and created impressive pieces of work which we are very proud of.

IN PRAISE OF CHURCH



It is not an easy job getting around all my 11 Parishes although I have found that attending Parish and Town Councils helps me to keep up to speed. The the other way is by attending village events, especially Parish lunches, which are amazing and I get to meet so many people.

You probably saw that we have a new Chief Executive who can't join us for another couple of months yet as he has to work out his notice as deputy Chief Executive for Surrey County Council. His name is Leigh Whitehouse and, until he can join us, Becky Shaw will stay and then return full time to East Sussex County Council.

I hope is that we get some good weather now for what's left of spring and look forward to a good summer



Michelle will be assisting the practitioners in these areas with group activities, family outings and general support which will enable us to work with more families and increase our offering in these areas. Our Worthing practitioner, Lydie, retired from FSW at the end of April - we are so grateful for her caring support of so many families over the years, particularly her work with refugee families, and wish her a long and happy retirement.

Last week we received a message from a young adult whose family we supported for many years. The young person was a teenager when we first started supporting the family, and had some very challenging experiences to deal with. The family is no longer on our client base but she and her practitioner remained in touch. We wanted to share her message with you as it really shows the value of our long-term support:

'I just want to say how grateful I am to you for helping me through life. It's been a long journey and a scary one too but I think I've nearly made it. I wouldn't have been able to do it without you. You mean so much to me and mum so I just want to say thank you for believing in me.'






